## Integration of Global Education

- Students will examine the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and relate its ideas to texts read throughout the year.
- Students will develop empathy for others around the world who do not enjoy the rights and freedoms we do in the United States.

## Specific Lesson Plan Modifications for Global Competencies

- Students will analyze how certain points from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights parallel essential understandings within chosen text sets.
- Students will decipher what each point in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights means and relate each to some piece of literature used throughout the year.
- Students will research how they can help enforce the Universal Declaration of Human Rights within their own community.
- Students will take action in an effort to validate a point (or points) of the Universal Declaration of Human rights.

## *Informal Outcome Assessments*

- Students will be able to write an expository piece analyzing which universal human rights were honored or trampled within texts read in class.
- Students will be able to discuss in small groups or as a class the merit of having a universal declaration of human rights.
